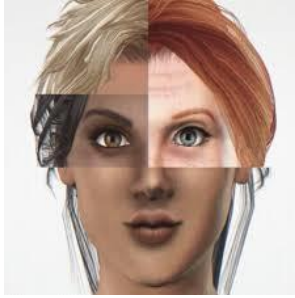

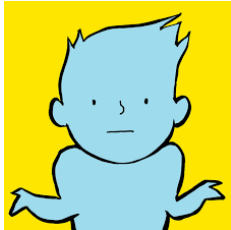

CONNECTED TOYS Consumer watchdog 'Which?' has concerns about the security of the new generation of 'connected' toys which connect to the internet. If the device's Bluetooth connection has not been secured a hacker wouldn't need a password, PIN number etc to get access, and share messages with a child. Toys using this type of technology include Furby Connect, the i-Que robot, Cloudpets and Toy-fi Teddy.
